### Senior executive message

Every year, one of the most exciting moments for me is just before Year 12 Presentation Day when our wonderful school magazine committee leader Julie Barel, often accompanied by desktop publishing guru Yvonne Lin, walks into my office with the freshly published magazine. Although I have already seen it frequently over many weeks as we prepare to send it to the printer, it's very special to hold the final published version, actually in my hands.

We may increasingly live in an online world ... at school, at work and in so many aspects of our lives, but it's hard to beat holding a beautiful publication in the offline world.

Our editorial committee, and design and layout staff, are acknowledged in the magazine. They work creatively and professionally every year. They call on help from many staff members, students and families in the school community, and from others beyond the school, to produce this rich record of our lives at work. Words and images seem to play with each other, reflected in the smiles we see across the pages. Thank you all!

The cover of this year's *Bridging the Distance* celebrates our learning hubs: north to the Central Coast, south to Miranda, south west to Ingleburn, west to the lower Blue Mountains and here in Woolloomooloo.

When we asked our teachers this year to name the most important things we do in our school, top of the list was the learning hubs. Our hubs are an investment in student learning and wellbeing that cost over \$250,000 a year, with all expenses except staffing funded by what is called the Resource Allocation Model Equity Funding, commonly known as Gonski funding. We are very thankful to hear that this will continue, even if not to the increased extent that would make possible even more opportunities.

As a Principal I have an important responsibility to ensure that decisions about how we spend money are made wisely based on actual evidence. While the feel of our school magazine may be a very good sensory memory for me, how does number crunching with a bit of basic statistical analysis actually guide decision making? Well, this year we expanded our hubs based on some impressive numbers from the year before. The tough question now is whether they really are worth more than a quarter of a million dollars?

This year's Annual Report which will be published on our website in Term 1 next year, will include some very impressive numbers for each learning hub. However, the bottom line is that 266 individual students (28% of all our home students) have visited a learning hub, a 29% increase from the previous year. There have been 1845 actual student visits, a 104% increase from 2017 and 86 teachers have visited, a 6% increase from 2017. These numbers are measured from the start of Term 1 to the end of Term 3, 2018.

So, we have seen more students, teachers and families at our learning hubs than ever before ... enjoying their work, making friends and learning with their teachers. Fridays at Woolloomooloo usually now include a learning hub, hospitality and retail students working with our coffee club, and a school choir!

The answer to the question, 'Is it worth it?' is very easy. Yes!

This year, we introduced a special learning hub award: The first recipient is our Learning Hub Roadie, Aaron Mearns, who also features in our most recent film, shown at each of our three presentation days to celebrate our learning hubs.

Finally, thank you to everyone in our huge and embracing school community. To those who have finished their studies with us: create futures that will touch lives, as yours have been influenced by being with us. To those who will continue to learn with us: we look forward to you enriching our school community as much as we strive to enrich your lives by being with you and your learning.

We used laminated stencil outlines of our faces to represent the bark canoes of Gadigal (Gadigalleon) women of the Eora Nation, fishing on the harbour with children and small fire. We reflected on all the positive qualities that women have instilled in us and pay respect to the memory of significant Aboriginal women who have influenced our lives.

## Sculpture by the Sea Excursion

Art students of SDEHS were lucky enough to visit this public art exhibition of 107 sculptures. They were various sizes and mediums and the artists came from all over the world including United States, South Africa, China, Japan and Australia. We met at Bondi Beach and walked along the trail which was 2km to Tamarama Beach. Conditions were perfect and



sunny, so we avoided heavy winds the day before and rain the following one.

The exhibition is unique because it is outdoors and goes along the coast. Sculptures are placed in different locations: on the rocks, up on the big grassy hill or sitting in the sand on the beach. You get to see amazing art and spectacular views both at the same time. Most sculptures seemed to be abstract shapes or based on the human figure. Others were humorous or environmental.

My favourite artworks were the large bronze animals, "Come Out, Come Out Wherever You Are" by Gillie and Marc Schattner (NSW). Their message was about protecting endangered animals from extinction including the tiger and the rhino. I also liked the inflatable sculpture "Damien Hirst Looking for Sharks" by Danger Dave and Christian Rager (UK). This work is based on the famous artist Damien Hirst, who made a sculpture with a real shark. It is colourful, fun and like a big blow up beach toy.

## NCCD at SDEHS 2019

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) is a compulsory national annual data collection. The NCCD counts the number of students in Australian schools receiving an adjustment due to disability.

The NCCD aims to provide data that will inform funding and enable schools, education authorities and governments to gain a more complete understanding of students who are receiving adjustments because of a disability in schools and how best to support them.

Students who have been identified by the SDEHS Learning and Support Team as receiving a reasonable adjustment because of a disability (under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992) will be included in the 2019 NCCD.

## Lou's Place

On 14 November, the Wednesday of World Kindness Week, Ms Therese Metzl took Emilie Clemmet, Aaron Mearns and me to present a donation of over \$200 to Lou's Place on behalf of our school. The money was raised as a part of our school's social justice initiative. Lou's Place is a women's refuge and drop-in centre, situated



in the heart of Kings Cross, for those who have fallen on hard times. We had the pleasure of meeting and giving the money to the Case Manager, who gave us a tour of the three storey terrace house and courtyard. We saw the communal areas where the women could eat, wash their clothes and socialise with one another, as well as a private room, used for counselling or legal advice if and when needed. Lou's Place has provided women in need with basic amenities, food, clothing, a warm bed and essential toiletries for 19 years, serving as a safe place where women are valued, possibly for the first time in their lives and cared for without prejudice or discrimination. In the dining room, we were thrilled to speak with the resident comedian, who, with jokes and quick wit aside, expressed her gratitude for being looked after and for the camaraderie she feels at Lou's Place.

Our time at Lou's Place has an indelible impact on our lives. It was an experience which brought home to us how fortunate we are. Since our visit, we have heard that our donation will be used to purchase essential items for the women.

### Disability Provisions 2019 Higher School Certificate

The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) offer a range of Disability Provisions to Year 12 students who may need assistance to read examination questions and/or write their answers in their Higher School Certificate Examinations.

If you think that your student may need to apply for Disability Provisions for the 2019 Higher School Certificate Examinations, please phone Alicia Gilmore on 9383 0298 or Rebekah Cowie on 9383 0460 and **request that an application form be sent to you**.

This form, together with relevant supporting documentation, will need to be completed by the student and supervisor and returned to Sydney Distance Education High School as soon as possible as some provisions require additional assessments and evidence submitted such as medical reports, reading assessments and assessment tasks.

The NESA closing date for Disability Provisions applications is **Friday 12 April 2019**.

Your completed forms will need to reach SDEHS by Friday 5 April 2019 to ensure that this deadline is met.

This information is to let you know of the need to apply for Disability Provisions in Term 4 2018 or Term 1 2019 for the 2019 HSC Examinations. Any approved Disability Provisions may be utilised for Trial exams and assessment tasks in Year 12.

them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student to read, to read more and to read more widely.


The 2019 Challenge will open on 4 March 2019, but students can record books they are reading now and include them on their 2019 reading records.




